WATER PURVEYOR PROFILE

The City of Warden has four wells. Two that pump from the Wanapum Aquifer and two from the Grande Ronde Aquifer. With the two Wanapum Aquifer wells on the western side of Warden, in close proximity to the East Low Canal, the City will intermittently get EDB (Ethylene Dibromide) spikes in one or both wells in early spring. Having two wells situated on the eastern side of the community allows for the main pump to be shifted as needed.

With the city economy reliant on the agricultural industry, including food processing it is vital to provide potable water to the community and the industries.



MAJOR ISSUES

 Aging infrastructure, i.e., steel water mains, booster station, and reservoir rehabilitation

IMMEDIATE NEEDS

- Replacement of steel water mains (25 miles)
- Reservoir interior coating replacement
- Seismic rehabilitation for reservoirs
- Undersized water mains, fire flow deficiencies

PUBLIC SAFETY

Aging infrastructure and associated funding availability

The City of Warden is fortunate to have acquired additional water rights in 2001 with an expected comfort level past 2043. The largest concern is the aging infrastructure, i.e., steel water mains, booster station, reservoir rehabilitation, and the associated funding availability and costs that pose a burden for a small number of connections in our community.
